### Introduction

A total of 47 teams from 19 countries are in the Official Draw for the 2017 edition of the AFC Champions League, which takes place in Kuala Lumpur on 13 December.

The Official Draw will determine the placement of teams for the tournament's group stage which kicks-off on February 20.

Of the 32 slots in the group stage, 24 have already been filled while the remaining eight will be decided after the preliminary stage and playoff stage, which take place early next year and involves 23 teams.

There are a number of former winners among the 24 teams that have sealed their places in the Group Stage including defending champions Jeonbuk Hyundai Motors of Korea Republic, Guangzhou Evergrande of China, Urawa Red Diamonds of Japan and Al Ain of the United Arab Emirates.

Former champions Al Sadd of Qatar are also in the draw but they will have to get through the playoffs in order to qualify for the group stage.

The eight groups are divided geographically with four in the West region and four in the East region. The group stage games will be played on a double round-robin basis with the top two sides in each of the sections advancing to the round of 16, which takes place in late May.

The round of 16, quarter-finals and semi-finals will be played on a zonal basis which will ensure an East vs West clash in the final next November.

The winners of the tournament will qualify for the FIFA Club World Cup in December 2017.

# Participating team information

# **AUSTRALIA**

#### Adelaide United

Adelaide United will appear in the group stage for the first time since 2012 after they topped the A-League Premiership table in the 2015-16 season and claimed their first league title with a 3-1 win over Western Sydney Wanderers in the Grand Final. The South Australian side reached the AFC Champions League final in 2008 and finished runners-up to Japan's Gamba Osaka but were eliminated by Shandong Luneng of China in the playoffs in 2016.

# **Western Sydney Wanderers**

Western Sydney Wanderers made history in 2014 when they beat AI Hilal of Saudi Arabia 1-0 on aggregate in the final to become the first Australian side to win the AFC Champions League. They won the A-League Premiership in their inaugural campaign in 2012-13 but have been league runners-up three times after losing in the Grand Final in 2013, 2014 and 2016.

#### **Brisbane Roar**

Brisbane Roar narrowly missed out on a third A-League Premiership title in 2015-16 and an automatic slot in the AFC Champions League group stage after a draw in their final regular season game saw them overtaken by eventual champions Adelaide United. They have appeared twice previously in the group stage but failed to advance on both occasions.

# BAHRAIN Al Hidd Club

Having bowed out to Qatari side Lekhwiya in the playoffs in 2014, Al Hidd Club will make a second attempt to qualify for the AFC Champions League group stage in 2017 after winning the Bahrain Premier League for the first time in 2015-16. They have played in the AFC Cup in the past three years, reaching the quarter-finals in 2014 but going out at the group stage in the last two seasons.

#### **CHINA**

# Guangzhou Evergrande FC

Two-time Asian club champions Guangzhou Evergrande will make their sixth consecutive appearance in the AFC Champions League after winning the double in 2016 as they clinched a sixth straight Chinese Super League title before beating Jiangsu FC on away goals in the Chinese FA Cup final. They won continental titles in 2013 and 2015 but were surprisingly eliminated in the group stage this year.

# Jiangsu FC

After finishing runners-up to Guangzhou Evergrande in the Chinese Super League in 2016, Jiangsu FC missed out on a second straight Chinese FA Cup title when they lost on away goals to Evergrande in the final. The Nanjing-based side were eliminated in the group stage in both of their previous appearances in the AFC Champions League.

# Shanghai SIPG FC

Shanghai SIPG made a fine debut in the AFC Champions League in 2016 as they reached the quarter-finals before going out to eventual winners Jeonbuk Hyundai Motors. Runners-up in the Chinese Super League in 2015, two points behind champions Guangzhou Evergrande, they fell off a bit last season as they finished in third place, 12 points behind the champions.

# Shanghai Shenhua FC

Shanghai Shenhua have a chance to qualify for the AFC Champions League group stage for the first time since 2011 and seventh time overall after they finished fourth in the Chinese Super League in 2016. They were beaten in the quarter-finals by eventual champions Jeonbuk Hyundai Motors in 2006 but have gone out at the group stage in their other five appearances in the tournament.

#### HONG KONG

#### Eastern SC

Eastern Sports Club coach Chan Yuen-ting made headlines this year when she led the club to their first Hong Kong league title in 20 years and became the first woman to lead a men's team to a top-tier football championship. The 28-year-old is set to make more history in 2017 when she becomes the first female head coach to take charge of a club in the AFC Champions League as Eastern make their first-ever appearance in the competition.

#### Kitchee

Runners-up in the Hong Kong Premier League in 2015-16, Kitchee will make a third attempt to qualify for the AFC Champions League in 2017 after going out in the playoffs in the past two seasons. ## INDIA

# JSW Bengaluru FC

Formed in 2013, JSW Bengaluru FC enjoyed immediate success as they won the I-League in their inaugural season in 2013-14 before lifting the title again last season. They were eliminated in the AFC Champions League playoffs in 2015 but made a strong run in the AFC Cup this year as they became the first Indian side to reach a continental club final.

# Esteghial Khouzestan FC

Established in 2011, Esteghlal Khouzestan won promotion to the Persian Gulf Pro League in 2013 and after struggling in their first two seasons in Iran's top flight, they produced a stunning run to their first-ever league championship in 2015/16 as they beat Zobahan 2-0 in their final game of the season to pip Persepolis to the title on goal difference.

#### Zobahan FC

Runners-up in the AFC Champions League in 2010, Zobahan returned to the competition last year for the first time since 2012 and reached the round of 16 where they were eliminated by eventual runners-up Al Ain. The Esfahan club finished a disappointing sixth in the Iranian league last year but lifted the Hazfi Cup for a second year in a row after beating Esteghlal on penalties in the final.

# Persepolis FC

Iranian league winners on a record nine occasions, Persepolis narrowly missed out on a 10th title last season when they finished behind champions Esteghlal Khouzestan on goal difference. The Tehran club lifted the Asian Cup Winners' Cup in 1991 but they have failed to sparkle in their previous AFC Champions League appearances with the best performances coming in 2009, 2012 and 2015 when they reached the last 16.

# Esteghlal FC

Two-time Asian Club Championship winners Esteghlal missed out on an automatic spot in the 2017 AFC Champions League after losing on penalties to Zobahan in the Hazfi Cup final but they can qualify through the playoffs after finishing third in the Persian Gulf Pro League. The Tehran side have made seven previous appearances in the AFC Champions League and reached the semi-finals in 2013 when they were beaten by FC Seoul.

### **JAPAN**

#### Kashima Antlers

Kashima Antlers were crowned J.League champions for a record eighth time in 2016 after they came back from a two-goal deficit to beat Urawa Red Diamonds on away goals in the championship final. While Kashima are Japan's most successful club, they have yet to shine in the AFC Champions League, reaching the quarter-finals in 2008 and going out in the round of 16 on three occasions.

#### Urawa Red Diamonds

Despite topping the overall J1 League table during the regular season in 2016, Urawa Red Diamonds missed out on a second league titlge when they blew a two-goal advantage against Kashima Antlers in the championship final and lost on away goals. The Saitama-based club were the first Japanese winners of the AFC Champions League in 2007 when they beat Sepahan of Iran 3-1 on aggregate in the final.

# Kawasaki Frontale

Kawasaki Frontale had the second-best overall record in the J1 League in 2016 but failed to reach the championship final after they were beaten 1-0 at home by Kashima Antlers in the semi-finals. They have appeared in the AFC Champions League on four previous occasions, reaching the quarter-finals in 2007 and 2009.

# Emperor's Cup winners / J.League 4th place – TBC

The fourth Japanese slot in the 2016 AFC Champions League will go to the 4th-placed team in the J1 League, Gamba Osaka, or the winners of the Emperor's Cup, which is now at the quarter-final stage. Gamba Osaka will qualify for the AFC Champions League group stage if they win the Emperor's Cup, or will go into the playoffs if Kashima Antlers or Kawasaki Frontale win the competition. If Omiya Ardija, Sanfrecce Hiroshima, Shonan Bellmare, FC Tokyo or Yokohama F.Marinos win the tournament, they will go into the group stage and Kawasaki Frontale will compete in the playoffs.

# JORDAN Al Wehdat

Al Wehdat won the first-ever AFC Champions League match in August 2002 when they beat Al Nejmeh of Lebanon 3-2 in the qualifying round. The 14-time Jordanian champions have taken part in the playoffs in the past two seasons but were eliminated by Kuwait's Qadsia SC in 2015 and Saudi Arabia's Al Ittihad this year.

### **KOREA REPUBLIC**

### FC Seoul

FC Seoul were eliminated in last year's AFC Champions League semi-finals by Jeonbuk Hyundai Motors but exacted revenge by beating their rivals 1-0 in their final game of the season to win the K League Classic championship. They will appear in the continental tournament for the fifth consecutive year in 2017, looking to improve on their runner-up performance in 2013 and semi-final appearances in 2014 and 2016.

# **Suwon Samsung Bluewings**

Suwon Samsung Bluewings rescued a disappointing K League season, in which they finished in the bottom half of the table, by winning the Korean FA Cup for the fourth time in 2016, beating rivals FC Seoul in an epic penalty shootout which went 10 rounds. Winners of the last two editions of the Asian Club Championship in 2001 and 2002, they reached the semifinals of the AFC Champions League in 2011 but crashed out at the group stage this year.

# Jeonbuk Hyundai Motors FC

Jeonbuk Hyundai Motors were crowned AFC Champions League winners for the second time this year after they overcame AI Ain of the United Arab Emirate 3-2 on aggregate in a hard-fought final. Their continental success made up for the disappointment of missing out on a third consecutive K League Classic title as they were overtaken by FC Seoul after a 1-0 loss to their rivals on the final day of the season.

#### **MALAYSIA**

### Johor Darul Ta'zim

Johor Darul Ta'zim were the first Malaysian club to win an Asian continental title when they beat Istiklol 1-0 to lift the AFC Cup in 2015. The Malaysian league champions have taken part in the ACL playoffs in the past two seasons but have yet to get past the preliminary rounds.

### Yadanarbon FC

# **PHILIPPINES**

#### Global FC

Global FC are the first Filipino side to earn a spot in the AFC Champions League playoffs after they claimed their third United Football League title in five seasons in 2016. They competed in the AFC Cup in 2015 but failed to get past the group stage.

### **QATAR**

#### Al Rayyan SC

After being relegated in 2014, Al Rayyan topped the second division the following season before winning the Qatar Stars League in decisive fashion in 2016-16 as they finished 14 points clear of runners-up El Jaish. They will look to improve in the AFC Champions League in 2017 after going out at the group stage in all six of their previous appearances.

# Lekhwiya SC

#### El Jaish SC

El Jaish will compete in the AFC Champions League playoffs for a third straight year in 2017 after finishing runners-up to Al Rayyan in the Qatar Stars League in the 2015-16 season. They were eliminated in the 2015 ACL playoffs by Naft Tehran but beat the Iranian side this year on their run to the semi-finals where they were eliminated 5-3 on aggregate by Al Ain.

#### Al Sadd SC

# SAUDI ARABIA Al Ahli Saudi FC

Jeddah-based Al Ahli enjoyed a memorable domestic season in 2015-16 as they claimed their first Saudi league title since 1984 before clinching the double with a 2-1 win over Al Nassr in the King's Cup final. However, the 2012 AFC Champions League runners-up did not fare so well on the continental stage this year as they were eliminated in the group stage.

Two-time Asian Club Championship winners Al Hilal have qualified for the AFC Champions League for a ninth straight time. They won the Crown Prince Cup for a record 13th time in 2016 and but endured much disappointment as they finished runners-up in the league, went out in the King's Cup semi-finals and crashed out in the last 16 of the AFC Champions League to Uzbek side Lokomotiv.

The club from Buraidah will compete in the continental tournament for the first time after securing their highest-ever league finish last season.

#### Al Fateh FC

Al Ittihad's exclusion from the 2017 AFC Champions League means that Al Fateh will compete in the playoffs despite finishing fifth in the Saudi league in 2015-16. The team from Al Hassa will look to give a better account of themselves this time after they went winless and finished bottom of their group on their ACL debut in 2014.

# **Tampines Rovers FC**

Tampines Rovers will take part in the AFC Champions League playoffs for the third time after finishing runners-up to Albirex Niigata (S) in the S-League in 2016. They were eliminated in the ACL playoffs in 2014 and 2016 but reached the AFC Cup quarter-finals this year.

# Muangthong United

Muangthong United were declared Thai Premier League champions for the fourth time this year as they held a four-point lead with three games left when the remaining matches were cancelled in October following the death of King Bhumibol Adulyadej. They appeared in the AFC Champions League group stage in 2013 but went out in the playoffs on four occasions.

#### Sukhothai FC

Having reached the Thai FA Cup semi-finals, they were declared a co-winner of the tournament and won a draw among the four teams to gain a berth in the ACL playoffs.

# Bangkok United

Known as Bangkok University when they competed in the AFC Champions League in 2008 as the Thai league champions, Bangkok United suffered relegation in 2010 but returned to the top flight two years later and finished third in 2012 and runners-up last season.

# UNITED ARAB EMIRATES Al Ahli FC

After missing out on the AFC Champions League this year, Al Ahli secured their return to the continental tournament by winning the Arabian Gul League title in 2015-16, finishing nine points clear at the top of the table. They finished runners-up in their last ACL appearance in 2015, suffering a narrow 1-0 aggregate loss to Guangzhou Evergrande in the final.

# Al Jazira

They qualified for the group stage for the seventh time in eight seasons this year but finished bottom of their group after picking up only a single point from six games.

It was one of three near misses for them in 2016 as they also finished second to Al Ahli in the Arabian Gulf League and lost on penalties to Al Jazira in the President's Cup final.

# **UZBEKISTAN**

### PFC Lokomotiv

After narrowly missing out in 2015, Lokomotiv captured their first-ever Uzbek league title in 2016, finishing the season 11 points ahead of Bunyodkor and Nasaf, before completing the double with a 1-0 win over Nasaf in the Uzbek Cup final. They also reached the AFC Champions League quarter-finals this year before going out 1-0 on aggregate to Al Ain.

# FC Bunyodkor

Bunyodkor reached the knockout rounds on their first seven AFC Champions League appearances from 2008 to 2014, making it to the semi-finals in 2008 and 2012, but they have gone out at the group stage in the past two years. They earned a spot in the AFC Champions League playoffs by finishing runners-up in the Uzbek league in 2016.

#### Hanoi T&T

## **Asian Football Confederation information**

The Asian Football Confederation (AFC) is the governing body of the football in Asia, including Australia with a total of 47 members. The organisation was founded on 8 May 1954 in Manila, Philippines and is one of FIFA's six continental confederations. The headquarters is at AFC House in Bukit Jalil in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia and the President is Shaikh Salman Bin Ebrahim Al Khalifa of Bahrain.

The AFC organised the first continental championship – the Asian Cup – in 1956, and introduced the first continental club competition – the Asian Club Championship in 1967. In 1990, they introduced another competition – the Asian Cup Winners' Cup, and in 1995, the winners of the Asian Club Championship and Asian Cup Winners' Cup began to meet annually in the Asian Super Cup.

In 2002, all three club competitions were merged into the AFC Champions League, which featured domestic league and cup winners from throughout Asia. More than 40 teams took part in the inaugural tournament but the competition format was streamlined in 2004, which featured the defending champions and 28 other teams from 14 countries.

The competition was revamped again in 2009 with 32 teams competing in eight groups. A round of 16 was introduced and the final was changed from a two-legged affair to a one-game championship match. The tournament format was tweaked again in 2013 with the final reverting to a two-leg format along with the round of 16, which had been played as single elimination games from the time of their introduction in 2009.
